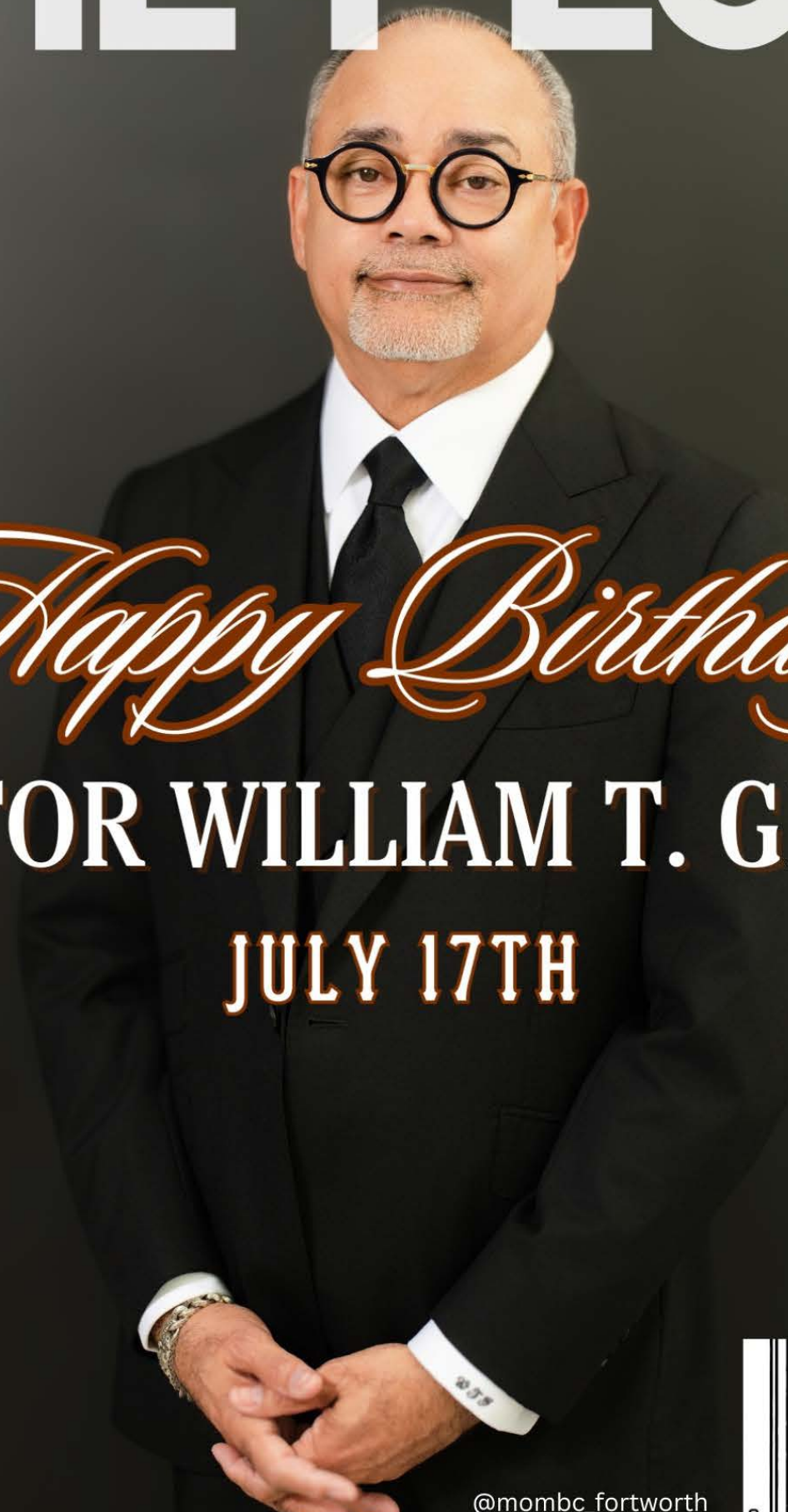


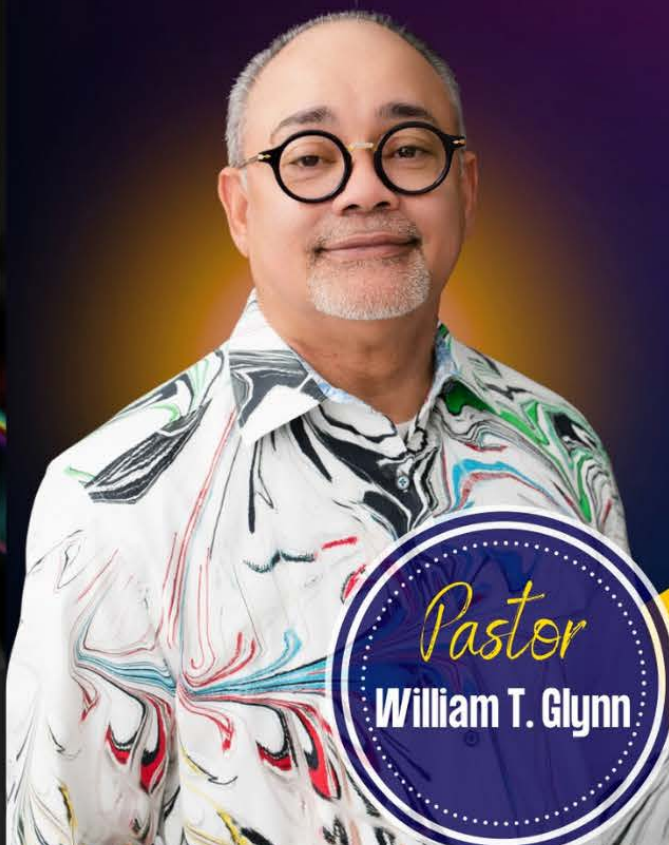

I'm Hooked – My Testimony Is My Bait

When I think about the theme, "I'm Hooked – My Testimony Is My Bait," I realize that my testimony is not just a story I tell—it is the life I live every day. My testimony is found in my faithfulness through trials, my perseverance through challenges, and my unwavering belief that God will never leave me nor forsake me. Like the Samaritan woman in John 4:7-15, 28-30, and 39-42, my encounter with God's love has given me something worth sharing with others.

The Samaritan woman came to the well carrying burdens that many people could see, but Jesus saw beyond her past and offered her living water. After meeting Him, she left her water jar behind and ran to tell others about the Savior who changed her life. Her testimony became the bait that drew an entire community to Christ.

My testimony may not begin at a well, but it has been shaped through seasons that have strengthened my faith. I am a wife and a mother who strives to lead my family with love and trust in God. I am also a student, balancing assignments and deadlines while pursuing the education God has placed on my heart. At the same time, I work diligently in a demanding career dedicated to serving others, knowing that excellence honors God.

Perhaps one of the greatest tests of my faith came on December 31, 2024, when my mother suffered a stroke. Overnight, my responsibilities grew as I stepped into the role of caregiver while continuing to work, study, and care for my own family. There were days when I felt physically exhausted, emotionally drained, and unsure of how I would make it through another day. Yet every morning, God supplied exactly what I needed. He gave me strength when mine was gone, peace when anxiety tried to overwhelm me, and grace for every responsibility I carried.

Through it all, I have learned that faith is not just praising God when life is easy. Faith is trusting Him when the schedule is full, when your heart is heavy, and when you cannot see the outcome. God has shown me that He is my provider, my comforter, and my source of strength. He has never failed me.

My testimony is not about having a perfect life. It is about serving a perfect God who has carried me through every season. Every late-night study session, every long workday, every moment spent caring for my mother, every sacrifice made for my family, and every answered prayer has become evidence of God's faithfulness.

Just as the Samaritan woman invited others to "Come and see," I want my life to point people toward Jesus. If someone sees me continuing to smile despite hardship, serving despite exhaustion, or believing despite uncertainty, I hope they will ask what keeps me going. My answer will always be Jesus Christ.

I am hooked because I have tasted the living water that only Christ can give. My testimony is my bait because it tells the world that God is still healing, still providing, still strengthening, and still transforming lives. If He can sustain me through every role I carry—as a wife, mother, student, professional, and caregiver—then He can sustain anyone who puts their trust in Him.

My prayer is that my story will encourage someone else to hold on, keep believing, and come to know the Savior who has been faithful to me. Just as many believed because of the Samaritan woman's testimony, I pray that my testimony will lead others to discover the hope, peace, and everlasting life found only in Jesus Christ.

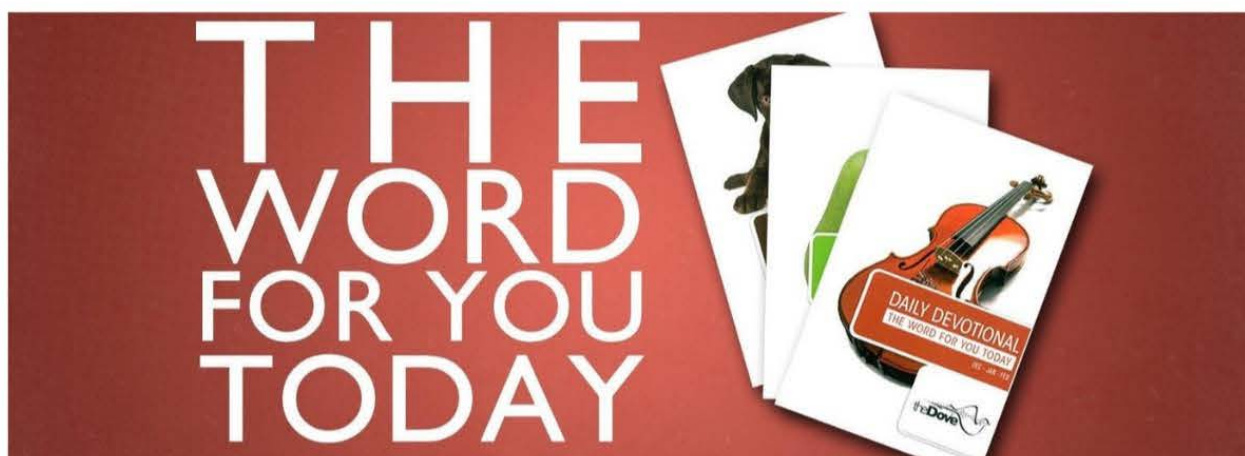

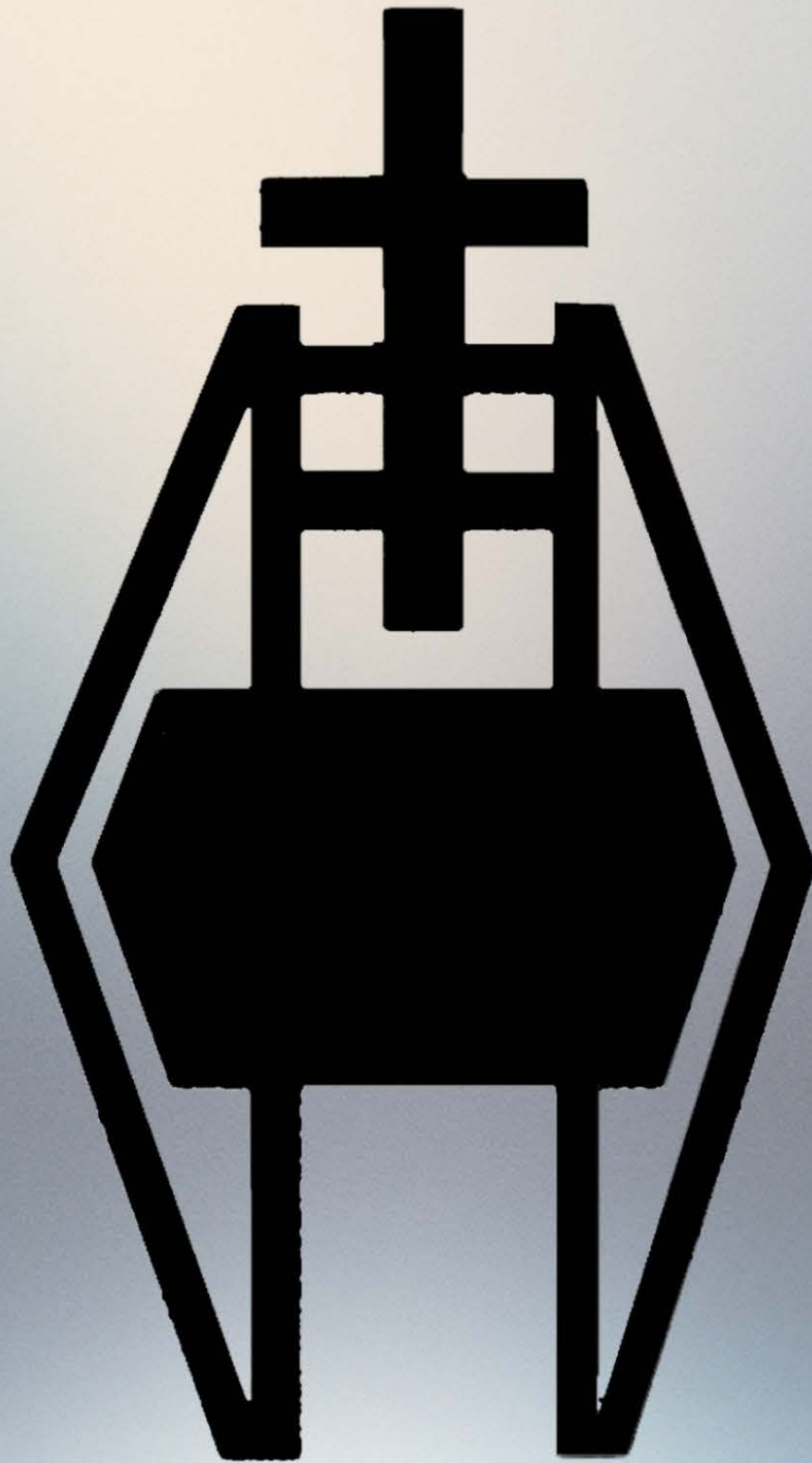

““Whatever things are...praiseworthy—meditate on these things.” Php 4:8 NKJV

Experts estimate that we have 50,000 to 70,000 thoughts a day. So let's use 60,000 as a happy medium. And let's observe four important things about our thoughts: (1) Psychologists say that 98 to 99 percent of our thoughts are habitual. In other words, they are basically the same thoughts we had yesterday, and the day before yesterday, and the day before that. Your mind must be renewed day by day (see Ro 12:2). You can't keep thinking the same things and expect a different outcome or a different outlook. What's the answer? Take on a learning mindset! "In all your getting, get understanding. Exalt her, and she will promote you" (Pr 4:7-8 NKJV). (2) Only 12 percent of our thoughts are focused on the future. But faith, by definition, is future oriented. "Faith shows the reality of what we hope for" (Heb 11:1 NLT). (3) A Harvard University study found that the average person spends 46.9 percent of their waking hours thinking about something other than what they are presently doing. And psychologists say, "A wandering mind is an unhappy mind." Of course, the most obvious culprits are the digital devices that keep us disengaged. Nothing dumbs down our ability to dream like our so-called smartphones! (4) The Cleveland Clinic estimates that 80 percent of our thoughts are negative. That's 48,000 negative thoughts per day! And when we verbalize those thoughts, it compounds the problem. What's the answer? "Whatever things are...noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy—meditate on these things" (NKJV).
